"Families need to know the local drug dealer is no longer only on the street corner. The new dealer may be your own medicine cabinet. Diverted pain medicines like Vicadin and OxyContin start many on the road to opiate addiction and contribute to the heroin threat throughout New England. Abuse of these pain medications devastates families and communities. Prescribed medicine, particularly pain medications, need to be secured and properly disposed of when no longer needed. The abuse of pain meds stolen from medicine cabinets is as dangerous to families as leaving a loaded gun on your kitchen table." — Brian Crowell, DEA Assistant Special Agent
